


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




Choose Your Adventure



This year we take a look at five very different, but equally intriguing destinations: Algoma, Berlin, Elkhart Lake, Seymour and Wittenberg. All within a short distance from the Fox Cities, these five locales can easily be added to your summer travel wish-list.



While traveling to your desired destination, be advised there is road construction taking place throughout Wisconsin that could impact your plans. Traffic, weather or other events may cause interruptions. We suggest factoring in extra time and checking online for the latest detour information on the Wisconsin Department of Transportation website, dot.wisconsin.gov/travel, and the U.S. Highway 41 Project website, us41wisconsin.gov, before hitting the open road.














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here isn't a single traffic light in Algoma. The streets aren't overrun with summer tourists, despite the breathtaking views of Lake Michigan. There aren't outrageous lines at the charming boutiques or long waits at the award-winning restaurants.

But what is in Algoma is better than all that. There is art around every corner, plenty of adventure and maybe a new friend or two. (If the residents of Algoma don't know your name already, they can't wait to learn it - they don't call it "Friendly Algoma" for nothing.)

Algoma, which is a Native American word meaning "park of flowers," prides itself on being laid back. Locals are quick to point out that they aren't

Door County, nor do they want to be. The pace is a little slower, things are a little quieter, but the

sights to see and things to do are just as numerous. Originally settled by English and Irish pioneers in 1851, Algoma is a town with a strong fishing legacy and continues to be a first-class port for salmon and trout, attracting outdoorsmen and adventure seekers year-round.

PRO TIP

The Lake Michigan shoreline between Algoma and Whitefish Dunes State Park is a great standup paddle board spot when the waters are calm midsummer. In the fall when the surf picks up, you may see some adventurous souls catching waves.



RECREATION

3 Iconic Algoma Sights

1: Pierhead Lighthouse

There may not be a landmark that's more "Algoma" than the Pierhead Lighthouse located at the end of the north pier in Algoma harbor. First established in 1893, the tower was oil-operated and made of wood. In 1907, the wooden beacon was demolished and replaced the following year with its signature red cast iron cylinder tower. The tower continued to evolve over the years and in August 2014, the lighthouse got a fresh coat of red paint. If you don't mind looking like a tourist, taking a selfie with the Pierhead Lighthouse in the background is a must.

2: Crescent Beach & Boardwalk

This award-winning boardwalk along the Lake Michigan shore connects the Algoma Visitor Center to the Algoma

Marina. The half-mile boardwalk, which was built by volunteers from recycled plastic lumber, is hands down one of the best places in Algoma to enjoy the sights and sounds of Lake Michigan. Step



off the boardwalk to explore Crescent Beach, a great spot to see a stunning sunrise or take a dip in the lake.

3: Walldog Wave Murals

In 2007, an international group of muralists changed the face of 10 historic buildings in downtown Algoma. During the Walldog Wave event, the artists created murals inspired by vintage advertisements that are reflective of Algoma's history and culture. The

Algoma Main Program's Historic Algoma Walking Tour brochure includes locations and a brief background on each mural. Visitors may explore these works of art along with the historic architecture unique to downtown Algoma. Stop by the Visitor Center to pick

up a brochure, learn about the town's history and see photos of the downtown buildings as they were originally built.





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Outdoor Hit List

A few of the best ways to get outside in Algoma.

Ahnapee State Trail

This 40-mile crushed limestone trail connects Casco Junction to Algoma to Sturgeon Bay. Enjoy the trail yearround by biking, horseback riding, walking, running, snowmobiling, snow shoeing and cross country skiing. The trail winds through evergreen glades, prairies and wooded areas with plenty of opportunity for wildlife viewing. Parking is available on Navarino Street in Algoma.

Birdwatching

Algoma was designated a "Bird City Wisconsin" in 2013. This means that opportunities for birds and birders are unparalleled. From ruby-throated hummingbirds to majestic white pelicans, summer bird viewing can run the gamut. In the winter, birders can observe bald eagles, mergansers, golden eye, buffleheads and long-tailed ducks.

Fishing

Looking to land a trophy fish? If it will happen anywhere, it will happen in Algoma. Nearly a dozen of Wisconsin's record fish have been caught in Algoma which currently holds three record titles. Go figure, Algoma is one of the top sport fishing ports in the Midwest, offering anglers pier fishing, launches for private boats, marinas and charter fishing outings with experienced captains.

Kewaunee Area Barn Quilt Tour

Local 4H and FFA students worked with the community to create and paint 18 "quilts" on historically significant barns throughout Kewaunee County. Algoma is home to several. agriculturalheritage.org/barnquilts for location information.

SHOPPING

Foodie Must-Stops

Algoma is home to an array of foodie-approved shopping destinations, including Bearcat's Fish House which is famous for its smoked and fresh fish. Bring in vour fresh catch and Bearcat's will process and freeze it for you. Wienke's

Market is located on Highway S between Algoma and Sturgeon Bay and offers farm-fresh produce, flowers,

fresh bakery items, canned goods and more. Five minutes north of Algoma, you'll find Country Ovens which specializes in dried cherries and Cherry De-lite products. Take a video tour while you are there to see how the fruit is processed for use in cooking, baking and snacking. Then learn why the best cheese curds squeak on a factory tour of Renard's Cheese in Algoma. Tours are by appointment only and include a fresh cheese sampling, of course.

Steele Street Stroll

Algoma's historic Steele Street is lined with quaint shops and galleries. You will discover Steele Street Floral and Gallery which is home to Good Tidings Nautical Gifts and Queen Bee Handmade Soap. (It's the one with the larger-than-life wooden pirates in front.) The multi-shop corner is filled with waterinspired decor and Algoma souvenirs, including the ever-popular

> "London, Paris, Rome, Algoma" tshirts. Across the street is Love Said So, a women's clothing boutique that comes with a side of confidence - no extra charge. Known for providing an uplifting shopping experience, the boutique's line of apparel, accessories and gifts changes often. Keep walking over 3rd Street and you will encounter Clay on Steele, a hands-on community art center with a focus on promoting ceramic art. The studio features potters wheels and all the equipment needed



No matter what you fancy, you'll find it in Algoma.

For the I-want-it-all shopper: Amber's Attic

Satisfy all your retail cravings in one spot at Amber's Attic where you will find an eclectic mix of antiques, gifts, home decor, glassware, china and furnishings; as well as local art, jewelry and cards.

For the girly-girl: Tina Marie's Boutique

Get ready for glitz, glamour and tulle. Lots of tulle. With the area's largest selection of evening wear and bridal gowns, Tina Marie's draws a festive crowd from far and wide. But you don't have to be a bride or a beauty queen to appreciate this boutique which also offers casual women's apparel, shoes and accessories.




For the homebody: Comfortably Numb Casual

Kendra Bulgrin Owner of James May Gallery


Originally from Racine, Kendra Bulgrin and her partner Jimmy Eddings lived all over the country before deciding to open a contemporary art gallery in Algoma last year. Learn what made Kendra, an artist and mother of two, fall in love with this little lakeshore town.

Why did you choose to open your gallery in Algoma?

Both my partner and I got our MFAs and planned to teach at the university level. We chased that dream for a while with one-year teaching positions all over the country. We finally wanted to put down some roots because we had kids and this moving every year wasn't going to cut it. I had a one-year position at UW-Green Bay and we lived in Kewaunee and just fell in love with this area. It's such a hidden gem. Our friends at Clay on Steele told us about this building. That was two years ago and we spent the entire first year gutting this place, installing concrete floors with in-ground heat and making a living space in back. Now I can still have a job and pursue my passions of painting and curating while being close to my family. It's perfect.

What is your vision for James May Gallery?

> It was important to us to make art really accessible for people. Galleries can be intimidating to walk into, so we wanted it to be friendly and inviting. We have a lot of ceramics which is Jimmy's area



What are your favorite things about this town?

We love Algoma. It's friendly and walkable - I don't drive for weeks at a time. We liked the grocery store nearby, having that downtown feel too. We have an

amazing beach, Crescent Beach. That's one of my favorite things about Algoma. The water changes everyday; it's just really beautiful. Algoma is really up and coming; it's really exciting. For artists, creatives and entrepreneurs, it's affordable, which is a great thing.

Dining To-Do List

These eateries will keep you fueled from morning to night.



Breakfast:

Caffe Tlazo's homemade quiche and coconut water iced coffee is a delicious way to kick off a day of sightseeing. For a true Wisconsin start to the morning, visit Dairy Dean's Family Restaurant which was recently voted Best Breakfast in Kewaunee County. On Friday mornings, try their world-renowned walleye breakfast - two eggs, American fries or hash browns and 6 ounces of walleye, either deep fried or panfried.

Lunch:

Indulge in some Texas favorites like a melt-in-your-mouth brisket sandwich or Frito chili pie at Southern Comfort Restaurant with a new location that opened in June. On Fridays and Saturdays, Red's Pub and Grill is open for lunch, serving up favorites like half-pound burgers and steaks. Algoma Pizza Bowl is a favorite lunch spot for locals. Sneak in a quick game of bowling while you're there.

Dinner:

The tagline at Skaliwags Food & **Spirits** is "food that's five star in a crazy little dive bar." The menu constantly changes, but expect to find fresh seafood, grass-fed Black Angus steak and southern style pastas, a throwback to Chef Chris Wiltfang's childhood in Georgia. If you feel like putting your own twist on the meal, build your own burger at Algoma Burger Company which is the newest

venture of Chef Chris. The historic Hotel Stebbins is home to a supper club and bar that will hit the spot if you are looking for casual fine dining with ambiance. The restaurant offers nightly specials including a Friday fish fry.

Dessert:

Don't forget to pick up something sweet from North Water Bakery to enjoy on Crescent Beach Boardwalk while overlooking Lake Michigan.

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Wine vs. Beer

Traveling with a wine snob or beer geek? No fear, Algoma has all your bases covered.

For the wine lover: von Stiehl Winery

Spend a day at von Stiehl Winery, Wisconsin's oldest licensed winery, housed in a Civil War-era building listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Enjoy a complimentary tasting in the tasting room, tour the 10,000-square-foot production facility and three underground limestone tunnels, then top it off with a glass of wine on the three-tier outdoor terrace overlooking Lake Michigan as well as the Algoma Lighthouse. Open 7 days a week, year round. Tours every hour, May-October.

For the beer enthusiast: **Ahnapee Brewery**

Don't let the garage doors fool you. The beer within is topnotch – from the Long Goodbye Munich Helles Lager to the Fun Guy English Brown. The Imperial Raspberry Ale with a tart, yet smooth berry flavor, will be

released July 2 and is perfect for summer sipping. They also serve snacks like handmade flatbread pizzas and warm pretzels, among other things. If you like pumpkin flavored everything, head back in the fall for Pumpkin Week (October 7–16) when Ahnapee's specially brewed Imperial Pumpkin is released.



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
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




t's easy to overlook the sleepy little town of Berlin, with the lure of her collegiate neighbor to the east (Ripon) and lakeside neighbor to the south (Green Lake). But for the adventurer who is willing to take the path less traveled, this gem of a community is just waiting to be discovered.

Berlin is a history-rich city. Founded in 1847 by Nathan Strong and having roots in Wisconsin's commercial cranberry industry, Berlin is split by the Fox River, which was once the highway for

French fur traders, Jesuit missionaries and several Native American tribes. Today the river and its picturesque shores offer recreation for residents and visitors alike. Quaint shops, a variety of dining spots and a host of events throughout the year make Berlin the perfect place to relax, rejuvenate and recharge.

HOMETOWN Q&A

Janet Broesch

Owner of The House on Park Inn www.thehouseonpark.com



It's the stuff of a Hallmark movie. In 2014, creative director Janet Broesch said goodbye to Chicago, her home of 20 years, and bought an 1855 Greek-revival hometurned-inn in Berlin's historic Nathan Strong Park neighborhood. Get to know

Janet and what brought her to Berlin (it might have something to do with a front porch).

What drew you to Berlin and such a drastic life change?

My brother and sister-in-law live in Berlin and own Izzy's Dockside Diner & Pub here on the river. Our family started coming up here to visit, help remodel and listen to music at the pub. I really liked the small town look and feel, and I started to picture myself living and working here.

How did you come to own the House on Park?

I've always wanted to own a home with a front porch. I think it has something to do with my love of "Gone with the Wind." My aunt and I were here helping my brother with his restaurant and we were staying at his in-laws' home. One of the busy days in the restaurant

my niece Lola took my aunt and [me] for a walk around the neighborhood. On our walk we came upon this house with a gigantic banner hanging off the



porch that said "Historic Home for sale." I immediately felt excited and looked the house up on the website. My aunt and I called to look at the inside the next day and [it] couldn't have been more perfect. I saw it in March and by August 1st it was mine. The home was so well taken care of that my updates have all been cosmetic: painting throughout, ripping out carpet to expose beautiful wood floors and landscaping. Overall I think you'd call the house eclectic, arty and fun - my aunt calls it the "Northern-Southern Mansion!"

What's your favorite feature of the house?

It's really hard to pick a favorite when there's just so much to love! But if you're twisting my arm, I'd have to say the front porch with the doors open to the living room and library. The porch is casual relaxation that sets the tone for the entire house.

What three words best describe Berlin?

Surprising. Interesting. Welcoming.

5 ways to escapade in Berlin

Swing some clubs. Mascoutin Golf Club is a 27-hole championship golf course lined with century-old trees. After you work up an appetite out on the greens, head to the Mascoutin Pub & Grill for lunch or a cocktail at the full bar.

Step back in time. The Museum of Local History and the historic Berlin Bottling Works Building are open the second and fourth Sunday of the month from 1-4 p.m. through August. Visitors can see an exhibit commemorating the 60th anniversary of a



tornado that hit the town and one that celebrates the history of photography in Berlin with an antique camera display.

Enjoy the outdoors. Bike, walk or run along the Mascoutin Valley State Trail which starts in Berlin. The 12-mile trail meanders past farms, prairies and wetlands, providing opportunities to view deer, geese and Sandhill cranes. If water is more your speed, spend a day at the Berlin Aquatic Center, complete with a 160-foot water slide, or launch your boat along the Fox River at Riverside Park, Longcroft Park or Berlin Locks

Make a tasty trip. Located about four miles north of Berlin on Highway 21, Willow Creek Cheese is a destination for cheese heads. Pick up some fresh cheese curds at the

retail outlet or take a tour on Monday or Wednesday mornings (8 a.m. is best) while cheese is being made. Call ahead to reserve a spot.


Take a drive. Rustic Road 22 passes through the DNR's White River Marsh Wildlife Area, crossing Sucker Creek and the White River. This scenic drive, with wildlife galore, will take you down Highway 23 to White River Road and Big Island Road.

Old School: Shepard's Drive-In

This drive-in is a Berlin tradition — summer officially begins when this seasonal slice of Americana starts slinging sundaes, burgers and their famous tater salad. (It's nearly impossible to attend a family picnic in Berlin without a pint of Shepard's potato salad.) With prices that are as throwback as the ambiance, Shepard's is a budget-friendly option with something to satisfy even the most nostalgic taste buds.

New School: Bellissimo Ristorante Italiano & Pizzeria

Opening to rave reviews in 2014, Bellissimo is the new kid on the Berlin block. Residents and visitors alike welcomed the restaurant and their brand of classic Italian fare featuring homemade pizzas, pastas and, the customer favorite, fresh grilled salmon. A full bar, always with a seasonal selection of martinis and mojitos, is the perfect place for a pre- or post-dinner drink.

Dining To-Do List

These eateries will keep you fueled from morning to night.

Breakfast:

Start the day with a diner-approved breakfast at Izzy's Dockside Diner & Pub. Try one of their breakfast skillets like the Berlin House Skillet - hash browns, sautéed onions, green peppers, sausage and cheddar cheese topped with two eggs, any style. Wash it all down with a bacon Bloody Mary. Another breakfast option is Clock Tower Family Restaurant, housed below Berlin's iconic clock tower.



Delicious homemade Mexican dishes with daily lunch specials can be found at Las Brasas Mexican Restaurant, a go-to lunch spot for Berlin locals. If you have time, stick around for Happy Hour starting at 3p.m. Monday through Thursday.

Famous for their Friday fish fry and legendary pizza, Jeff's On the Square is the place to go if you are looking for a little supper club atmosphere. Try the house speciality—one pound of tailless beer-battered shrimp.

Dessert:

Our Little Sweet Shop closes by late afternoon, so stop in earlier in the day to pick up an after-dinner treat. Bakery items are constantly changing, so choose whatever is fresh that day.

A Berlin Tradition:

W.C. Russell Moccasin Co.

W.C. Russell Moccasin Co. has been synonymous with quality craftsmanship and artistry in footwear since 1898. Originally designed for hunters and outdoorsmen, their

handcrafted boots and shoes have become popular with anyone who appreciates attention to detail, unparalleled quality and world class comfort. The construction of a pair of Russell boots hasn't changed much over the years, which is why it takes 14 weeks to receive new boot orders. Each pair is made to measure, designed custom for every individual, then shaped, stamped, tacked, stitched and trimmed by

skilled bootmakers. The company only employs about 30 people, yet will make upwards of 10,000 pairs of boots in a year. Stop in the Russell Moccasin workshop on SW Franklin Street to learn about the bootmaking process and get fitted for your very own oneof-a-kind pair.



















Antique Shopping Trail

The hunt for antique treasures is never ending and Berlin, with its wide array of vintage boutiques, is the perfect place to pick up chase.

1: Saving Grace Salvage Company

St. Joseph's Catholic Church has been reimagined as the home of Saving Grace Salvage Company. The main sanctuary,



choir balcony and basement are stuffed to the gills with vintage finds. With vaulted ceilings and stained glass windows, the old church makes a dramatic background for everything from bed frames to barn wood.



2: Back Porch Gatherings

At Back Porch Gatherings, vintage and antique furniture, garden items and home decor pieces are displayed as vignettes to inspire even the most seasoned antique hunter. With a sister store in the neighboring town of Ripon, Back Porch Gatherings offers twice as much vintage to love.

3: Old School Vintage

Furniture fiends will find their fix at Old School Vintage Upholstery and Retail Sales which specializes in custom furniture pieces. The store sells furniture, handmade items from local artisans and vintage decor.



This retail resale antique shop oozes with vintage charm, featuring hand-created items, vintage finds and gifts.

5: Chicken Scratch Vintage

Located on State Road 49 in Berlin, this antique hot spot is only open every other weekend, which heightens its exclusivity. Find antiques and vintage items for your home and garden in the farm shed and yard.

6: Sweet Clover

At Sweet Clover, handmade gifts are made onsite using repurposed wood and fabrics. Find upcycled treasures to bring home as the most thoughtful souvenirs (or just keep them for yourself).

7: Ted's Art & Antiques

This eclectic antique store is open every day except Sunday unless the owner is traveling to an antique show, which occurs from time to time.

If you happen to miss him, it's worth a return trip to wade through the store's treasures.

Contemporary/Classic

Fashionistas rejoice - Berlin is home to a variety of boutiques, from classic to cutting-edge. Unfussy fashion is in abundance at Violet & Company, a contemporary women's clothing boutique that opened in 2015. Comfy t-shirts with cheeky sayings (like "Make Coffee, Not War"), breezy tops and dresses, and plenty of accessories make it the go-to destination for when you want a hip, new look. A mainstay of Berlin's retail district since 1861 is Eskimo Comfort which specializes in outdoor apparel. The store boasts more than 5,000 coats and jackets, as well as moccasins and women's clothing. Make sure to stop in Hamilton's Shoe Store, one of the oldest shoe stores in the state. Looking for something both artistic and refined? Hamilton's Ladies Apparel has a little bit of everything with clothing that will take you from work to the weekend.

It wasn't until 1885 that Charlie Nagreen opened his first hamburger stand and many years later that Seymour began to celebrate his invention.

Today, visitors from across the country come to Seymour to find the facts - The Travel Channel, Food Channel and the History Channel have all made the trek to Seymour to learn

Hamburger Charlie's story.

Aside from its hamburger glory, Seymour has even more to offer, including the county fair, weekly live music and a scenic nature trail.

Local Legend: Home of the Hamburger

In 1885, at age 15, Charlie Nagreen decided to load up his ox cart and sell meatballs 20 miles north of him, at the fair in Seymour. When he arrived, though, he realized the inconvenience of meatballs in a place where people were constantly moving. In an ingenious business move, Charlie decided to smash his meatballs between two pieces of bread and call it a hamburger, an appeal to

the German population in the area who were familiar with the Hamburg steak.

Not convinced that Seymour is the true Home of the Hamburger?



Take a walk into the Seymour Community Museum and you'll find all the proof you need. The entire entrance to the museum is dedicated to Hamburger Charlie, Seymour's own inventor of the hamburger, and is surrounded by a plethora

of hamburger memorabilia.



The museum also features interactive exhibits outlining what life was like in Seymour's early days. Exhibits include The Barber Shop, representing a shop run by Mack Miller. Here, you can listen to an interview with a former employee of the shop, Chuck Miller. The Kuehne History Display outlines the history of R. Kuehne and Company and provides a video game where you can prove your knowledge of the town. You'll also find The Medical Office, where you will discover many of the tools used by Dr. Hittner, the man who developed the "button hole" appendix procedure, revolutionizing modern surgery.

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

Homme from Winchester, Wisconsin, arrived in the area in 1879 to provide assistance to orphans, the elderly and Native Americans in need. Homme convinced the Milwaukee, Lake Shore and Western Railroad to change the name of its station from Carbonero to Wittenberg in honor of Wittenberg, Germany, where Martin Luther posted his 95 theses. Homme recruited

friends and former parishioners to settle in the area and by 1885, there were 40 families who called Wittenberg home.

From its early days, Wittenberg has grown into a town that provides year-round family fun

through outdoor recreation, community events and unique art experiences.




